



Bachelor of Arts & Science degrees offer a strong springboard for a wide variety of career choices. > Behavioural Science (Bachelor of Arts - 3 or 4 yr)

Careers: counselling, social work, community development, youth and child work, graduate studies

- Prepare for professional programs including education
- Hands-on field experience with practicum and international community development

> Biology (Bachelor of Science – 4 yr)

Careers: research, professional studies, lab technician, teaching

- Choose between General Biology, Bio-medical Science, or Kinesiology streams
- Courses necessary for Medicine, Dentistry, Chiropractics, Pharmacology, Optometry and Veterinary Medicine
- Research and field experience include Bamfield Marine Sciences Centre (BC), Costa Rica and the Galapagos Islands

> Business Administration (Bachelor of Business Administration – 4 yr, Bachelor of Arts – 3 yr)

Careers: entrepreneurship, marketing, management, accounting

- Develop practical business skills for the marketplace
- Focus on entrepreneurship and economic development
- · Make a difference with a global imapct
- Explore faith lived out in the business world

> Christian Studies (Bachelor of Arts - 3 or 4 yr)

Careers: non-government and para-church organizations, graduate studies

- Focus on Bible, Christian Theology and History, or Christian Spirituality
- Grow in biblical and theological literacy and experience personal transformation
- Explore biblical landscapes and ancient Christian traditions in award-winning educational travel

> Education (Bachelor of Education, after degree – 2 yr)

Careers: education, administration, certified teacher

- Two year, intensive 60 credit cohort program focusing on elementary education (K-6)
- Prepare to teach in public schools, First Nations settings, inclusive and multicultural classrooms as well as developing countries
- Emphasis on technology integration, program development and curriculum design
- Engage with material and develop skills on an individual basis

> English Literature (Bachelor of Arts - 3 or 4 yr)

Careers: editor, technical writer, journalism, law, communications, graduate studies, teaching

- Form a strong foundation in literature, literary theory, and writing
- · Study British, Canadian, American, and world literatures
- Think critically about literature, language, and culture
- Learn to write with judgment, clarity, and imagination



> General Studies (Bachelor of Arts - 3 yr)

Careers: teaching, human services, public relations

- Think in an interdisciplinary fashion as you study general arts and sciences
- Learn to read, write and think critically
- Demonstrate skills in research, writing, and presentation across a variety of disciplines
- Integrate faith and reason throughout degree

> History (Bachelor of Arts - 3 or 4 yr)

Careers: politics, teaching, museums, law, library science

- View the contemporary world historically
- Choose from courses on Canadian Society, Christian History, the Middle East, the holocaust and more
- Uncover the past through original historical documents
- Explore history through field trips, movie nights, educational travel, and museums

> Music (Bachelor of Music – 4 yr, Bachelor of Arts – 3 or 4 yr)

Careers: performance, teaching, musicology, worship leadership

- Gain a foundation in music theory, history, aural training, composition, and applied courses such as conducting and piano pedagogy
- Focus on a classical music core with opportunities to apply these skills in a breadth of musical genres
- Study your instrument in applied lessons with an accomplished instructor
- Participate in one of three choirs; chamber orchestra; brass, jazz or guitar ensemble

> University Studies (Diploma - 2 yr)

Careers: further education, entry level positions

- Gain fundamental grounding in a variety of disciplines
- Fully transferable to Ambrose degrees
- Most courses acceptable for university transfer

Faculty Of Theology

The Bachelor of Theology (BTh) and Bachelor of Ministry (BMin) degrees are designed to develop the skills you'll need in ministry and they concentrate on biblical literacy, theological reflection, and personal, spiritual, and professional formation.

Field Education

Mentorship, field experience, insight into ministry and spiritual growth are integral to preparing for ministry. Practicum and Internship are built in to all ministry programs at Ambrose.

Practicum begins in your second year for 5 – 6 hrs/week, while Internship happens before the last year of your program. Internship is typically full time for 3 – 12 months.

- Focus on Behavioural Science, Development Studies, Biblical Languages or Pastoral Missions
- Experience our Government of Alberta award-winning educational travel, through on Site

> Worship Arts (Bachelor of Ministry - 4 yr)

- Understand the nature of worship
- Gain the leadership skills necessary to build an effective worship ministry in the local church
- · Participate in chapel worship teams, touring worship bands, national or international touring choirs, as well as ensembles

> Youth Ministries (Bachelor of Ministry - 4 yr)

- Learn to relate your understanding of God's Word to a rapidly changing youth culture
- Learn teaching, counselling, administrative and programming skills that will prepare you to serve the church and community

> Associate in Ministry (Diploma - 2 yr)

- Develop ministry gifts for volunteer and paraprofessional roles in churches and other Christian organizations
- The Associate in Ministry (AIM) diploma provides foundational knowledge of the Bible and Christian thought, with the goal of applying that knowledge in service

> Bachelor of Theology (4 yr)

- Study, understand and interpret Scripture in Greek and /or
- Prepare for graduate biblical or theological studies

> Post-Professional After-Degree (Bachelor of Ministry - 2 yr)

- This option might be a fit for you if you've completed a professional post-secondary diploma
- The diploma must have been at least two years in length, offered by an approved institution
- Gain the knowledge and competencies essential for effective leadership and ministry in a variety of pastoral positions



Educational Travel

Experience world culture and history while earning credit toward your degree. Each year Ambrose students venture all over the world with fellow students and professors to be servants, be challenged, be stretched and to be changed.

> Behavioural Science

Students explore firsthand the intersection of sociological and community psychological theories and their application in an international setting. Be involved in research and development of today's world issues of poverty, HIV/AIDS, and community development interventions.

> Biology

Research and field experience are critical to the life of a science student. You can dredge for marine life, examine the tidal pool on shore or study the intertidal zones at Bamfield Sciences Centre. Other opportunities include ecological studies in Costa Rica and the Galapagos Islands.

> Business Administration

Practical, experience-based learning opportunities. Add value to work in the field while developing your own business skills, and contribute to vibrant and on-going international partnerships. Options range from economic development and microfinance in Latin America to global business in the European Union.

> Christian Studies

Ambrose's award-winning educational travel study program— Down Ancient Paths—is an imaginative opportunity to experience aspects of the history, theology, spirituality and geography of diverse traditions of ancient Christianity. Locations include Syria, Israel, Egypt, Jordan, Malta, Germany and Ireland.

> English Literature

Combine theory and practice by matching literary texts with literary landscapes. Reflect critically not only on culture, place, and landscape but also on the ways in which texts produce our understandings of culture, place, and landscape. From London to Stonehenge, Salisbury Plain to the Lake District—connect with literary figures such as Chaucer, Gower, Shakespeare, Wordsworth, Milton and more.

> History

Step outside the classroom into history as you venture from the medieval castles of Germany, to the reformation monuments in Switzerland, to the ancient sites in Rome and Greece—while gaining an understanding of historical figures such as Luther and Calvin and the Roman Empire.

> Intercultural Studies, on Site

on Site, another Government of Alberta award-winning program, offers students 7-10 months of ministry practicum and study overseas. Learn the history, language and culture while experiencing an extended, in-depth practice of ministry. on Site is the internship for the Intercultural Studies program and is open to all Ambrose students.

> Music

Ambrose choirs and chamber singers perform and tour a variety of locations across Canada and Europe each year helping students learn the music, theory and history of significant music locations and perform in festivals and cathedrals.



Admissions

Basic Admission Requirements

Five grade 12 level courses including English 30-1, with a minimum overall average of 60% on the five courses.

- 2. List A or B
- 3. List A or B

- 5. List A, B, C or D

All students whose primary language is not English must demonstrate their English proficiency through one of the following:

TOEFL

- 560 on paper based version; 83 on internet based IELTS
- Minimum score of 7.0

> Canadian Students

High School:

- · Basic admission requirements.
- Additional program specific requirements.

Home School:

- Basic admission requirements and program specific requirements, or
- Portfolio; SAT Reasoning Test with minimum score of 1400 on three sections (Critical Reading, Mathematics, and Writing) and no section below 400; official letter from home-schooling board verifying Grade 12 courses.

Mature Students:

- · Basic admission requirements, or
- If you are 21 years of age or older by September 30 you may be considered for Mature Student status with the following:
 - (a) English 30-1 or equivalent with a 60% or higher.
 - (b) Additional program specific requirements.

> American Students

High School:

- · High school diploma.
- ACT with minimum score of 22 or SAT Reasoning Test with minimum score of 1400 on three sections (Critical Reading, Mathematics, and Writing) and no section below 400.

Home School:

 Portfolio; SAT Reasoning Test with minimum score of 1400 on three sections (Critical Reading, Mathematics, and Writing) and no section below 400; official letter from home-schooling board verifying Grade 12 courses.

> International Workers

Students whose parents are working overseas will be considered for admission based on their curriculum of study. For example, students living in Brazil and studying the US curriculum will follow the American Student requirements.

> International Students

- · Basic admission requirement equivalent.
- English proficiency.
- All official transcripts must be provided in English.

> Transfer Students

If you have attended a post-secondary institution you may be considered for admission with the following:

- · Minimum 2.0 gpa on 15 credits.
- Program specific requirements.

Transfer credit will be evaluated upon completion of application.

International Baccalaureate

- Students will be evaluated on an individual basis and may receive transfer credit or advanced standing.
- Higher Level IB courses with a grade of 4, 5, 6 or 7 will be evaluated.

Advanced Placement

- Students will be evaluated on an individual basis and may receive transfer credit or advanced standing.
- AP courses with a grade of 3, 4 or 5 will be evaluated.

> Music

- · Basic admission requirements.
- Entrance audition in person or by submitting a recording.
- Students must demonstrate music theory at the Royal Conservatory of Music's Grade 2 level or its equivalent.

> Biology

- Five grade 12 level courses including English 30-1, Math 30-1, Biology 30, and Chemistry 30 or Physics 30 with a minimum overall average of 60% on the five courses.
- Physics and Calculus are recommended but not required.

> Worship Arts

- · Basic admission requirements.
- · Entrance audition.
- Students must demonstrate music theory at the Royal Conservatory of Music's Grade 2 level or its equivalent.

> Post-professional

- Completed a professional post-secondary diploma of at least two years in length from an approved institution.
- Diploma must include 36 transferable credits in general studies including equivalence of EN 115 Intro to Literature and Language and COM 100 Public Speaking.
- Diploma must include 18 transferable credits in professional studies.
- Prior ministry experience and relevant gift and personality testing may receive prior learning credit.

Finance

> Entrance Scholarships

All new students who have not previously attended a postsecondary institution and have a 75% high school admission average are eligible for scholarships in Academic Excellence, Servant Leadership, Music and Athletics.

Application Deadline: March 31

> Presidential Scholarship

All new students who have not previously attended a postsecondary institution and have a minimum 75% high school admission average are eligible for the full tuition Presidential Scholarship.

Application Deadline: January 31

> Transfer Scholarships

Students who are transferring from another post-secondary institution to Ambrose are eligible for up to \$2000 with a minimum 3.0 gpa in full-time students.

Deadline: June 30

> Christian High School Scholarship

Ambrose offers up to \$3000/year in Academic Excellence and Leadership Excellence scholarships to students who attend Christian High Schools.

Deadline: January 31

> Continuing Scholarships

Ambrose awards an extensive number of scholarships each year to returning Ambrose students based on academics, leadership and program.

Students can choose from a variety of campus jobs to work around your course schedule, or in the surrounding neighbourhood and Calgary.




